
Oheese and Butter Export.

The cheese exports from the port of Montreal for the season of 1896, show that the total shipments, reached 1,726, 285 boxes, as against 1,710,756 in 1896, au increase for 1896 of 15,529 boxes. This represents a ceturn of about \$11,652, 000 for this year, the price netted being generally 75s more, or averaging \$6.75 per box, equal to a surplus of about a million and a half of deliars over 1895, when the figures were \$10,260,000. It is estimated sgain that as it costs possibly 25c per box to receive and ship cheese from Montreal, that this turpover involved a further half million dollars, and hence the disbursements on cheese this year total some \$12,000 000, which, spread over the six working months of the season, gives \$2,000,000 a month.

The butter exports to same date total 157,821 pkgs. as against 69 664 pkgs. in 1895, and 32,065 pkgs. in 1894, showing that this branch of produce export trade ing, and is five times greater than 1894. The returns to the farmer from the largely increased butter business are in the neighborhood of two million dollars, as nuch again as he earned in 1895, and the future looks particularly promising in view of the fact that Canadian butter can now be considered to have established itself in England, and there is a market there for quite \$40,000,000 worth.

It is contrary to the regulations of the post office department for postage stamps to be removed from any postal packages before the same have been deivered to the parties to whom addressed. for the reason that when the packages or parcels are not delivered and have to be returned to the country of origin it is necessary that such parcels should be re-turned intact. Collectors of customs have, therefore, been instructed that under no circumstances are postage stamps to be removed from postal packages or parcels while the same are under customs


