U. like some noted surgeone of this city, he had the advantage of a good collegiate education before receiving the degrees of doctor of medicine and meeter of surgery (M. D. C. M) supplemented by two years' work bacteriology as d pathology in the laboratories of Berlin, as well as a year's sudy in the greatest clinics of Europe and America. As a consequence, he is what may be very properly

termed an 'acc mpliered surgeon. And his wetheds show the results of his excellent training. It has been my fortune to see the work of the most distinguished surgeons of America and Europe but cander compels me to say that, taken from all stand points, Dr. Ferguson is the best operator I have ever met. With the utmost regards for sepsis (and if ideal sceptic surgery can be done, he in doing it) he is by far the meet rapid of Chicogo operators While he has not the brilliance feperch possessed by Murphy, or the inexhau til . upp y of clinical material Senn, he is nequestionably destined to be a formideble competitor of both. Although he has been in Chicago but little more than a year, he has presented some of the most interesting suraisal cases I have ever-seen in the clinics here, and in surprisingly large numbers.

To this artificial Poupart's ligament the structures above and below were firmly surured and with the most brilliant results. He does not like Ozerny's method of excision of the sac, and has utterly discarded Kocher's plan of twisting the sac before invagination. He uses silkworm gut drainage in all his hernia operations,

emoving it at the end of a week. Dr. Ferguson is as firm a supporter of catgut in aseptic operations as I am. He, like myself, has practically discarded silk, except for intestical sutures, using catgut for all buried work and silk-worm gut for the skin. He uses a seculiarly prepared catgut, which seems better than any other I have ever seen. It is first subjected to some secret process which renders it perfectly pliable and very strong, after which it is subjected to sterilization by dry heat at a temperature of 284 degrees Fahrenheit for three hours. Each strand is then placed in sterilized tissue paper and enclosed in a sterlized paper envelope, which is hermetically sealed and only opened when ready for use. The envelope is then dipped in bichloride solution, 1 to 500, and torn by the nurse; the surgeon them extracts it with fosceps, removes the tissue paper and uses the gut It is almost impossible to break eyen a medium-sized strand. And in more than a bundred cases in which Dr. Fergusen has employed it, there has not been any suppuration in a single one. It can at present be obtained only frem Noyes Bros. & Outler, St.

Paul, Minn. Dr. Ferguson has a syringe of peculiar ex-cellence for the injection of iodoform emulsion into joints, etc., as well as for exploratory aspiration. It possesses the advantage of being so constructed as to allow boiling, and so perfect sterilization. If, for example, one septrates a suspicious tumor and finds pus, the common syrings is forever spoiled for other than known purulent cases, as there is no practical means of perfect sterilization; but this syringe is made entirely of metal, so that it can be boiled as many times as used, and so preserved in an absolutely asoptic state. It can be purchased at a comparatively low price.
