West Victoria Farmers' Institute Meetings of the West Victoria farmers' institute were held in W. Odell, Wednesday, December 2nd, and in Lindsay, the Friday following.

In the Dominion of Canada women have municipal suffrage in every province and also in the north west territories. In Ontario they vote for all elective officers.

In Delaware suffrage is exercised by women in several municipalities. In Kansas they have equal suffrage with men at all municipal elections.

In Utah women voted equal disfranchised by the "Edmunds Law," when they promptly organized to demand its repeal.

In Pennsylvania a law was passed in 1880 under which women vote on local improvements by signing or refusing to sign petitions therefor.
