THE MANITOBA SCHOOL QUESTION.

The Globe and the reform leaders de serve every credit for the systematic way in which they manage the roman catholic clergy and people. Where would the roman catholic church be when the present "Territories" are erected into provinces? Why they dare not ask for separate schools. If they accepted the settlement, openly satisfied, where would they be in a few years in Manitoba when they will be asking amendments to the proposed Greenway act? You may wage your last nickle the roman catholic church is tickled to death over the settlement-What did Mgr. Begin of Quebec, just returned from Rome from meeting the Pope, say three days before the Cornwall election, so that it could be used to help Laurier and our fellows? Why, that the Mood Kard. Pope would not express an adverse pinion, but that meantime the matter would be considered.

"More than that, nearly all of the bishops are on our side and in favor of Laurier; only two or three in all Canada Globe knows that the bishops are afraid Laurier, a French roman catholic is leader. OUR DEFENCES.
