Town Council
Tuesday, 29th Dec.
An adjourned meeting held this evening to wind up the business of the year.
When the Mayor called the meeting to order at 7:30 o'clock a few vacant seats were noticed, which in a few minutes were filled, all the members being present except Mr. Thurston, who was unable to be present owing to the death of his daughter.
The following communications were read:
Correspondence from G. M. Furby, manager of the Midland loan company, and the Clerk, in reference to arrears of taxes on a portion of the Dunford estate for 1895 and 1896. On motion of Mr. James Graham, seconded by Mr. Killaly, it was decided to accept the amount offered, \$177.20, being the net amount of taxes.
From Hugh O'Leary, Q.C., on behalf of James Wilson and Mary A. Wilson, giving notice of an action for damages, for injuries sustained by Mrs. Wilson, owing to a defective sidewalk. Referred to the Mayor and town solicitor.
A number of accounts were read and referred to the finance committee.
The Mayor stated that Mr. Hodson would shortly visit Lindsay to ascertain the amount of accommodation that could be had for the provincial winter fat stock show.
Report of finance committee read, recommending the payment of several accounts; that the request of William McDonnell, in reference to the Doran taxes, be referred to the town solicitor; that the accounts between the township of Ops and the town be balanced; and that the request of Margaret C. Adam, re reduction of taxes on the Waverly house, be granted. Report adopted.
The chairman of the street and bridge committee read the report of the street overseer for the past year as follows:

After a short discussion and an explanation by street overseer Walker, the report was adopted.
The fire and water committee reported in favor of granting J. L. Shannon's request. Report adopted.
Mr. Sootheran presented the report of the town property committee, recommending the payment of an account to William White of \$8.70; and that the purchase of the two lots for park purposes be left over for the consideration of the incoming council.
In moving the adoption of the report Mr. Sootheran stated he had learned since last meeting that the property could be purchased for \$1,000, which he did not think large considering the prices paid for adjacent property. The speaker went on to show that the cost of making the property into a desirable park would be but a small item.
After a short discussion the report was adopted.
The special committee re Hanna McCabe mortgage, reported that as the interest was paid no action be taken at present. Report adopted.
Mr. Ray moved, seconded by Mr. Thurston, a motion of sympathy with the death of his daughter, which was carried by a standing vote.
The Mayor on motion of Mr. Ray, vacated the chair which was taken by Mr. James Graham.
Mr. Ray in a neat speech moved, seconded by Mr. Sootheran, a vote of thanks to the Mayor for the courteous manner in which he had discharged his duties during the year. The motion was spoken to by every member of the council and carried by a standing vote.
The chairman conveyed the motion to the Mayor in a few well chosen remarks, congratulating his worship in being re-elected by acclamation.
The Mayor on resuming the chair returned thanks, not only for the vote of thanks but to the council and citizens for re-electing him Mayor by acclamation.
The minutes were read by the clerk, when the council of 1896 adjourned and became an item of history in the annals of Lindsay.
GOT ONE YEAR—W. H. Fleming, the young dental student, late of Dr. Hart's office, and who was found guilty in Toronto some time ago of trying to forge Mr. Goodenham's signature for a \$2,700 check, was on Thursday of last week sentenced to one year in the Central prison by Judge McDougall. Before sentence Fleming made a carefully prepared speech asking for mercy. As it was the judge said he let him off with a very light sentence.
