Mr. J. W. Curtis of Port Perry has sold his a decision as to the advisability of constructing a road to James' Bay. The whole province is not less interested than Toronto in the problem of getting access to the great inland sea that lies behind us. It is just possible that James' Bay will be first tapped by the line that runs from Mattawa to Kippewa and Temiscamingue districts. The objective terminus of this line is Moose Factory, on James' Bay. A start northward has been made from Mattawa, and it is not improbable that Mattawa, and it is not improbable that the first route to James' Bay will be an extension of this line. There is a large and growing lumbering and agricultural business along the line of the lake Temiscamingue colonization railway. Our Mattawa contemporary advises Toronto merchants to besitr themselves to get a portion of it. 'Through some mental obliquity, says the Tribune, Toronto business men seem to have the idea that their line to North Bay is all that is necessary to reach the centre of the lumber trade. It is true that North Bay is only forty-five miles from Mattawa, but for all the purposes of reaching the lumbering trade by that route it might be four hundred and fifty miles away. To Mattawa alone belongs the right to the claim of being the distributing centre, for from this town runs the lake Temiscamingue olonization branch of the C.P.R., reaching into the Kippewa and Temiscamingue districts, the final terminus of which is to be Moose Factory, on James' Bay. To tap the immense trade, amounting to millions in the aggregate, the Grand Trunk line to North Bay is simply valueless.' It is stated by our contemporary that Mr. Booth, who built the Ottaws and Parry Sound railway, bas taken over the charter of the Lindsay, Haliburton and Mattawa railway, which was obtained at the last session of parliament. It is said to be his intention to construct a line between Haliburton and Mattawa, a distance of eighty-five miles. The Toronto board of trade is invited to confer with Mr. Booth and assist in the establishment of a quick and direct route to the Mattawa country and the new districts being opened up to the north of it."
