Four Favorite Recipes.

MARBLE CAKE. - For the light part use the whites of three eggs, one-half cupful of butter, one cupful of sugar, one-half cupful of milk, two cupfuls of flour, one-half teaspoonful of soda and one teaspoonful of cream of tartar. For the dark part use the yolks of three eggs, one cupful of molasses, half a cupful of butter, two cupfuls of flour, one-third cupful of milk and one large teaspoonful of soda. Flavor with mixed spices. Butter the pan, and put in alternate layers of light and dark parts, having the light part on top.
INDIAN BREAD.—Scald one pint of bolted

meal with one quart of boiling water; add a small cupful of molasses, and when cool half a cupful of yeast; add a teaspoonful of salt, and white flour sufficient to make it a soft dough; stir thoroughly, and let it rise over night. Place in pans, let it rise up once more, and bake in a hot oven threequarters of an hour. Remove from the oven, add place a napkin wrug out of cold water over tho top of the loaf, and let it remain until served.

BEEF OR PORK PIE.—Boil the required quantity of fresh lean pork or beef, cut in small pieces, in plenty of water, seasoned with salt and pepper, until very tender. Make a crust as for baking-powder biscuits, and line a two quart basin with the paste. Now add alternate layers of meat and small pieces of dough until the dish is two-thirds full. Season the broth with plenty of butter, and slightly thicken with a small spoonful of flour stirred in a little cold water, and add it to the broth. Turn the broth over the meat, cover with a crust of paste and bake until done.

MINCE MEAT FOR PIES.—Boil six pounds

MINCE MEAT FOR Pies.—Boil six pounds of beef until tender; when cold, chop it fine. Chop twice the weight of good, tart, juicy apples and a pound of suet very fine. Dissolve a glass of current jelly in a quart of boiling water and add it to the mixture; also stir in a pint of molasses, a pound of sugar and a cupful of strong coffee. Stir all well together, and put it in a porcelain kettle, and when warm, stir in one pound of seeded raisins, the same of currants (thoroughly washed), a tablespoonful of cloves, the same of cinnamon, and a grated nutmeg; also a tablespoonful of salt. Cook two hours over a slow fire, stirring it occasionally. When filling your pies from the mixture, if not sufficiently moist, add another glassful of dissolved apple or currant jelly to the mixture. If kept in a jar in a cool place, it will keep good for several months.
