Why Ice Water is Injurious.

The reason why so many physicians object to the drinking of water during mealtime is that Americans, as a rule, drink ice water. The temperature of the stomach is from 98° to 100° Fahrenheit. After a meal it should be from 99° to 102°. and if a person is exercising it sometimes will run up to 103°. Now this temperature is necessary to carry on digestion in a perfectly healthful way. Constant drinking of ice water during the meal or an ice at the close of the meal will reduce the temperature of the stomach sometimes to 95°, which would stop digestion and sooner or later render one a confirmed dyspeptic. Water of an ordinary semperature is not so objectionable—in tact, it would be better to take a swallow of water now and then during the meal provided the water is cool, not feed. Foods that are slightly diluted are more easily digested than those which are con centrated and dry.—Mrs. S. T. Rorez in February Ladies' Home Journal,

The deaths from typhoid in the cities were 14, and in the towns and townships 21. The total deaths from scarlatina were 6. Of these the cities return four, and out of the total number of deaths from tuberculosis which are 113, the cities return 65 and the town and townships 68.

At the dairy department of the Ontario agricultural college it was found that during the last year it has cost from \$24.86 to \$39,89 to feed a cow for one year. The average of the herd is about \$81 per cow for the year. The quantity of milk produced per cow for the year varied from 2,389 lbs. to 7,944 lbs. per cow. The average was 5,421 lbs. of milk per cow or the heard. The amount of butter varied from 120 lbs. to 424 lbs; average, 244 lbs per cow. The pounds of cheese per cow ranged from 300 to 954 lbs. per

Among other things which it is understood the Grand Trunk Railway authorities are considering for the benefit of their patrons, is the lighting of their passenger cars. In England, one or two of the railways light their cars by electricity in a novel way. The system con-sists in providing each car with a small dynamo placed beneath it and worked directly by a belt passing over the axie. When in motion the car supplies sufficient power to drive the dynamo and at the same time to store electric energy in an accumulator ready to supply light when the train is standing.-Ex

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
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
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
