County Council.

Report of West Victoria Farmers' Institute. Report of Boboysgon and Woodville public libraries. From Children's Aid Society, asking grant. From the clerk of the county of Simcoe transmitting draft of memorial to legislative assembly...

On motion of Mr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Bryan, a deputation composed of D. J. McIntyre, Esq., G. O. Thomas Connolly, and Wm. McWhorter and Meddame Trew, Weldon and Sharpe addressed the council on behalf of the "Home."

Moved by Mr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Shaver, that the standing committee on finance and assessment be instructed to take into consideration and report on the advisability of granting the sum of \$100 for the support of the Home.

A deputation consisting of J. W. Knight, Wm. Steers and Thos. Connolly addressed the council on behalf of the children's aid society. Moved and seconded that finance and assessment committee report on advisability of making grant to the children's aid society.

Mrs. Sharpe placed in the hands of the Warden a memorial from the W.O.T.U., relative to the house of refuge and other matters. Referred to finance and assessment committee.

Moved by Mr. Ellis, seconded by Mr. Fox, that the standing committee on finance and assessment be instructed to report on advisability of making the usual grants to the East and West Victoria farmers' institutes. Carried.

Mr. Steers addressed the council on the subject of the communication from Barron and Steers. Submitted to the council.

Moved by Mr. Cameron, seconded by Mr. Fox, that the road and bridge committee be instructed to report on advisability of petitioning the minister of railways and canals to construct a bridge over the Trent Valley canal where it crosses the boundary between the townships of Eldon and Carden. Carried.

The finance and assessment committee was instructed to report on advisability of making the usual grant to the Victoria rifle association.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Ellis, that the finance and assessment committee be instructed to take into consideration and report on the advisability of granting the sum of \$50 as a salary to a county constable in each of the unincorporated villages in the county of Victoria having a lock-up house within its limits, the said constable to be appointed on a petition signed by at least twenty-five ratepayers of the village; the said salary to be paid quarterly on orders signed by the county magistrate. Carried.

The report of standing committee on printing was adopted.

Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Lithgow, that the standing committee on roads and bridges be instructed to take into consideration and report on the advisability of memorializing the Ontario Legislature at the next session of the Legislative Assembly, praying that a measure or amendments to the municipal act be enacted with reference to the boundary roads and bridges as shall clearly establish the fact that the bridge over Burnt River at the village of Kilmount on the boundary road is a county bridge to be maintained by the counties separated by the boundary road of which the said bridge is a part and that the memorial be forwarded to the member for the east riding of Victoria. Carried.

The report of the standing committee on county property was adopted.

The finance and assessment committee was instructed to report on advisability of making the usual grants to the various public libraries in the county.

FOURTH DAY

The following documents were laid before the council:

- Report of the Home. Report of Children's Aid Society. Report of Little Britain Public Library Association, applying for grant. The foregoing documents were referred to respective committees to which they belong.

The committee on education was instructed to report the names of persons to be appointed to the office of trustees of the Lundy collegiate institute and the Omeme high school, respectively, and also the names of persons appointed members of the board of examiners.

A petition to His Excellency the Governor General, praying that an appropriation be made for the improvement of the navigation of the Segoug river at Lindsay, was read, and it was ordered that it be engrossed and signed, and transmitted for presentation.

The Warden informed the council he had received a message from the council of the county of Peterborough, informing the whole council had been appointed a delegation to wait on the Dominion government and urge the continuation of the work of construction of the Trent Valley Canal, and requesting that a delegation be sent by this council. Referred to standing committee on finance and assessment.

Mr. Shaver, on behalf of Mrs. Chambers, widow of the late John Chambers, tendered her thanks to the council for the expression of their sympathy.

A petition to His Excellency the Governor General, praying that an appropriation be made for the re-building of the lock at Boboysgon, was read, and it was ordered to be transmitted for presentation.

Report of committee on education was adopted.

By-law No. 1, to appoint high school trustees, was read and passed.

Moved by Mr. Johnson seconded by Mr. Austin, that finance and assessment committee be instructed to take into consideration and report on the advisability of making a grant to the India famine fund. Carried.

By-law No. 1, to appoint a board of examiners, was read and passed.

The finance and assessment committee was instructed to report on advisability of granting for purposes of charity, the sum of twenty-five dollars each to the villages of Woodville, Fenelon Falls, Boboysgon and Omeme, and also making the usual grant to the South and North Victoria agricultural societies.

FIFTH DAY

The report of finance and assessment committee was adopted.

On motion of Mr. Shaver, seconded by Mr. Lithgow, by law No. 2, to authorize the Warden and treasurer to borrow money was passed.

On motion of Mr. Johnson, seconded by Mr. Austin, by law No. 3, to amend by-law No. 420 entitled "By-law to provide for the licensing, regulating and governing the hawkers and pedlars licenses" was read and passed.
