### "ON TO WASHINGTON"

Hon. Sir Richard Cartwright and Hon. L. H. Davies, members of the Dominion cabinet, have gone to Washington as official representatives of Canada to seek to negotiate a reciprocity treaty.

An advance guard, scouts, spies, or by whatever name their conduct merits, John Charlton, M.P., and Edward Ferrar, pre-occupied the two cabinet ministers to the capital of the neighboring republic, and in the American press pointed out the great value of Canada's markets especially to the farmers of the United States.

From the view point of the reform party such may be good policy, but a review of treaty-making presents no similar conduct, except perhaps in the secret treaty of Danby and King Charles II. It has not yet been proven that Canadians are in the pay of the United States government, but it will not be denied that reform leaders have received large payments of money from wealthy Americans, the recompense to be the handing over of Canada's markets to the farmers and manufacturers of the United States.
