WITH ONLY 48 HOURS TRAINING in two years, E. A. Pitkin, son of Mr. P. G. Pitkin of this town, made a good showing in the world's championship races held at Montreal. The champion race run off in pairs, the man making the best time winning the race. In the 500 metres international amateur event Pitkin met Lordal of Christiania, Norway, and Norway man winning by 3 seconds. In the 200 metres he won easily from Lee of Montreal, but not being hard pressed did not make as good time as the winners of some of the other pairs. This event was run off again on Monday, but the Toronto man was unable to race, having to be back in the city Monday. In the 240 yards dash, Ad secured 3rd place, winning a handsome medal. Saturday's daily Star contains a picture of the Lindsay boy, showing him in racing form.

A NEW CANADIAN ORDER.—Throughout the British Empire schemes are on foot to commemorate the diamond jubilee of her Majesty the Queen. In Canada among other suggestions is that of the National council of suggestions of Canada, of which Lady Aberdeen is president. The council proposes to found a "Victorian order of home helpers." The helpers are to work in the country districts, to be all-wives of distress and help in times of trouble. They are to be strong capable women of more than thirty years of age, who have passed such examinations as will attest their ability for nursing and for the management of homes. Parishes and townships are to be encouraged to choose some women who to the confidence and respect of her neighbors and who is willing to become a member of the order, and districts wishing to secure the services of a home helper are to undertake to give a certain sum yearly towards her maintenance. Families unable to pay anything for the services of a helper will have to be certified by their clergyman, doctor or some other local authority when they will be provided with help free of charge. To obtain such a scheme as this. Financially, one million dollars will be required but it is hoped that the generosity of the Canadian people will readily supply this.

While cutting meat in Calvert's butcher shop on Tuesday Mr. Thos. Campbell, the south ward, an employe, severely cut himself, the knife slipping and cutting an artery in his thigh. A doctor was called and after tending to his injuries the young man was removed to his home.

Yesterday night about 10:30 one of the dispatchers at the G. T. R. station noticed that Mr. Gain's restaurant booth at the rear of the station was on fire. With the help of snow the blaze was soon extinguished. It was clearly a case of incendiarism.

On Friday last the dwelling house and most of the contents, owned and occupied by Mr. James Moyness, Pleasant Valley, Fenelon, was entirely destroyed by fire. Children playing with matches on a lounge started the conflagration. There was an insurance to the amount of about \$300.

Much is being said in the papers all over the country as to the best method of commemorating the diamond jubilee. A gentleman in town made the very sensible suggestion that Lindsay people should establish a free library as one way to signalize the completion of the 60th year of her Majesty's reign.

FAT STOCK SHOW.—In accordance with the request from Lindsay, Brantford, Ingersoll and other places to have the Ontario fat stock show this fall, Mr. F. W. Hodson, of Fenelon, president of farmers' institutes, and Mr. John L. Hodson, chairman of the fat stock association, have been visiting the different places in the interests of the association to find what places would be most suitable for the show. Thursday of last week they arrived here and on Friday in company with Mayor Smith, Mr. Johnson Ellis, president of the South Victoria agricultural association, Mr. James Keith and others visited the different places where accommodations could be given the show, the agricultural buildings, the outline and the skating rink. It is said that they will report favorably. As western Ontario has had this show for a number of years it is only fair that the east should have it, in which case Lindsay will get it. The show, besides being beneficial to the town and country, would give an encouraging impetus to stock raising in this district. All the indications now point to a revival in the live stock interests of the Dominion. Organizations such as those to promote the industry and it is all important to give it enthusiastic aid.
