

Two years ago last Saturday, Feb. 6th, Sir Oliver Mowat received probably the most influential deputation of prohibi tionists that ever appeared before him, and in response to their request, preferred in the name of the pavilion convention, then in session, promised to submit the question of the legislature's jurisdiction FOR LONG YEARS. re prohibition to the privy council and, in the first session of the legislature after judgment thereon should be given by 1 rgest measure of constitutional prohibition warranted by the decision.

On May 9th, 1896, or fifteen months after Sir Oliver's pledge was given, the privy council rendered its judgment, which, while placing the matter of the prohibition of manufacture and importapoint of extinction.




