Rev. S. J. Shorey will preach at Reabro next Sabbath at 3 p. m. in the union church.

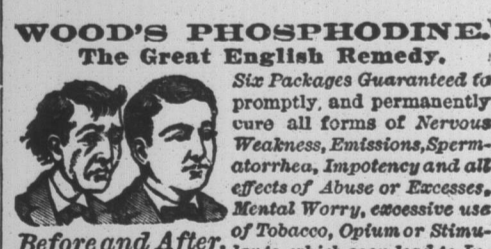
With good sleighing, beautiful moonlight nights and the weather all that could be desired, sleighing parties have been very numerous of late.
