

A deputation waited upon Mr. Laurier in February asking for the extension of the Intercolonial from Point Levis to Montreal. Mr. Laurier gave an evasive reply, which the party organs interpreted as a polite refusal. One of them at once commented on the proposal. It said:-

"The Grand Trunk already has a line from Montreal to Levis, though it is not as short a one as could be built. The Canadian Pacific has a parallel line on the north shore from Quebec, opposite Levis, to Montreal. A third line is not needed."

The Globe quoted the opinion on March 6 and characterized it as "good hard sense." On March 25 the purpose of the government to make the extension was announced in to make the extension was announced in the speech from the throne. The Globe found at once that the government had reached a powerfully wise decision, and that it was bent upon giving competition, eheapening rates, and what not. It was "good hard sense" when the third line, that is not needed, was not to be provided, and "good hard sense" again when the third line, that is not needed, was officially announced. This curious case illustrates the ease with which "good hard sense" is cultivated in ministerial quarters.—The Mail.

M. MERRY DEL VAL.

The papal ablegate, M. Merry del Val, who comes to Canada on the invitation of Hon. Mr. Laurier and the reform members and senators from Quebec, endorsed by the whole party from other provinces, has reached Ottawa.

He has been welcomed by Hon. Mr. Laurier personally. On Tuesday the House of Commons was adjourned at four o'c ock in the afternoon, the nominal reason being, the non-preparation of business; the real cause being that that afternoon the reform government were stating their case to M. del Val.

That case as stated in the reform papers consisted in newspaper quarrels between the bishops and certain roman catholic editors over matters having no connection whatever with the Manitoba school question.

Tuesday evening Hon. Mr. Laurler gave a dinner at his residence in honor of M. del Val, and indeed he and his colleagues seem leaving nothing undone to make the visit and the mission of their

The ablegate must understand that, for whatever purpose he may have been brought to Canada, this great Canadian people will not tolerate or recognize any nediation that is not part and parcel of the British constitution. It is altogether likely that M. del Val, who certainly is a skilled diplomat, will see the position in which Hon. Mr. Laurier and his coleagues have placed him.

If there is a quarrel between the bishops and some newspaper editors it is not a new thing in history. If those editors feel aggrieved and as they claim are oppressed there are various avenues through which redress may be had. Among these are :-

(1) The right of every man to leave the church if it does not suit him or if it tyrannizes over him. (2) The right to o

ourts of Canada and Great Britain. (3) The right to find redress in the parliament of Canada.

There is no quarrel between the bishops and the people of Quebec over the Manitoba school question. As stated it is a family quarrel among bishops and editors, and the reformers, as usual in protestant

centres, endeavor to make it seem that they are martyrs to romish tyranny in Quebec.

They cannot successfully advance the statement that the appeal is simply a church matter. The first paragraph of the famous manifesto to Rome disproves their pretences on that score. The address signed by Hon. Mr. Laurier and his roman catholic followers in the Senate and House of Commons, to the Pope of Rome himself clearly shows it not a church quarrel but a "constitutional" one. They

The paragraph reads: Most Holy Father.-We, the undersigned members of the Senate and members of the House of Commons of Canada, and representing therein the liberal party, present ourselves before your Holiness as respectful and devoted children of the holy church, to complain of the existence
