## DISSOLUTION OF PARTNERSHIP.

**House of Commons Notes.**

A summary of the histories of members of the PARLIAMENTS.

Major Thomas Beattie of London, a conservative, is a Belfast Irishman, a wealthy retired merchant, and a widower is very deservedly popular. He is major in the 7th Fusiliers and is a new member of this parliament. In figure the gallant major is medium height, erect in bearing, and of powerful frame. A smile is ever on his face, but he is one of the most earnest and painstaking members of the House. In all events at Ottawa Major Beattie is in demand.

Thomas Bain of Westworth, Dundas P.O., a reformer, is a distinguished Scotchman, 63 years old and a Canadian since 1837. He has been in parliament since 1872. Mr. Bain is an impressive, earnest debater; and under cover of an extremely honest expression of face and voice can when he chooses drive very close to the lines of "starching" without exciting suspicion. Mr. Bain all round is one of the ablest men of the House. Like Mr. Henderson of Hatton one is prompted on looking at Mr. Bain's honest expression—"Oh if I could only be as good as Mr. Bain looks I would be happy."

Robert Beith of West Durham, Bowmanville P.O., a reformer, descended from an Argyllshire Scotch family, was born in Darlington township in Durham county, Ontario, several years ago. Mr. Beith does not dabble much in debate but is a very good worker on committees. His experience with horses, and general farming and milling make him a useful member of the agricultural committee. Robert is unmarried and, therefore, much sought after by the fair sex of Ottawa. He has been a member since 1891.

John W. Bell of Addington, Desmond P.O., a liberal-conservative, a Canadian, is most impressively honest and conscientious man in the House. Like Mr. Bain of Westworth, Mr. Bell's presence always tends to persuade the atmosphere with a deep religious feeling. In orange circles Mr. Bell has risen to be grand master of the grand lodge of Ontario East. In parliament from 1892 to 1890 defeated in 1891 and re-elected in 1896. Mr. Bell is tall, dark heavy broved and a deep reader. He has great interest in committee work and is popular with his colleagues.

W. J. Bennett of East Simcoe, Midland P.O., descended from a north of Ireland family. Mr. Bennett's record is familiar to WARDER readers. He is a handsome young bachelor barrister, born in 1859. In parliament since 1892, the member for East Simcoe is regarded as a fluent debater and good worker. His sharp retorts and scathing sarcasm cause his opponents to give him respectful attention in debate, while socially he is in the greatest demand. The wonder of the House is how he has run the gauntlet so long and not become entangled in matrimonial toils. In figure Mr. Bennett is medium height, light in weight, with light brown hair and regular features. While Midland's pet boy is popular with the ladies as well as in social circles among men he is a good worker in parliament and looks well after the interests of his constituents. What at first sight might appear a wary selfishness in his character proves on better acquaintance to be a mere mannerism. Mr. Bennett is a good singer and reciter of stories.

B. M. Britton Q.C., of Kingston, a reformer, is a Canadian descended from American parents. He is 64 years old. His wife is daughter of the late Hon. L. A. Holton, one of Canada's noted reform leaders. Mr. Britton is a peculiar looking man. His hair and beard are white, his head erect, the figure about medium height, but slender; altogether a typical New Englander in figure. Mr. Britton stands high in his profession and through a new member is already a good parliamentarian.

Andrew Broder of Dundas county, Morrisburg P.O., a conservative, presents a very unique appearance. Descended from a Silco Irish father and a Belfast mother and born in Huntington county, Quebec. Mr. Broder is a thorough going citizen. Prominent in orange circles he is always found on the side of toleration and liberty. One of the best campaign speakers, and convincing parliamentary debaters in the House the member for Dundas has few superiors as an all round useful member. Tall, slim, with pointed reddish beard, high hair and prominent features Andrew Broder talks in a manner and language commands attention as a more than average man. From 1875 to 1886 he was a member of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario. Elected to the Parliament of Canada in 1896.

**A Decaying Power**

In these times when we hear so much about Turkey it is the popular idea that owing to the jealousy of the great powers and their non-aggressive attitude towards that country, the power and domain of the Turk remains intact.

As a matter of fact, since Turkey began years ago to occupy the attention of Europe, her power has been decaying, her domains are slipping away from her and the population which has passed out of the Sultan's power is now greater than that which he at present rules.

The areas that have become totally independent of Turkey are: Roumania, Servia and Montenegro by the Berlin treaty of 1878; Thessaly, surrendered to Greece in 1881; and Eastern Armenia, including Kars, Ardahan and Batoum, which came under Russian control also by the Berlin treaty.

Areas now possessing complete automatic government, which were formerly liable to direct Turkish administration, are: Egypt, Bulgaria and Samos, while Bosnia and Herzegovina, Cyprus and Tunis are now subject, respectively, to Austrian, British and French control, although formally recognizing the suzerainty of the Porte.

The total area of the above named countries is 602,020 square miles, with populations aggregating 24,890,000 while the Sultan's rule effects only 22,000,000 altogether. Thoughtful people have been asking the question of late, whether it would not be the more statesmanlike and humane course to leave Turkey strictly alone, and allow those natural but surely and deadly moving forces to silently pursue their way.
