

WAR IS DECLARED.

The news from the East this week is startling indeed, for war is raging between Greece and Turkey, all along the Graeco-Turkish frontier from Mount Olympus to the gulf of Arta.

The two armies, that have been thronging the frontier for the past few weeks, hostile in feeling, of different race and religion and with all the jealousies that have been the outcome of years of strife, could not well be kept from battle. At this distance from the field of action one is unable to know the ins and outs of the recent events that have led to war, but it ooks very much as if Turkey had become red of the cocky attitude of Greece and

the petty strife carried from the frontier ato her country by Greek irregulars, captained by Greek officers.

The outcome of the war is doubtful. On land Turkey is more powerful; on sea Greece claims supremacy. The Turks, as recent dispatches say, fight like infurlated devils. The courage of the Greek has never been questioned. The Turk has the advantage in numbers. Whether the war will be confined to these two countries is also another uncertainty. Should the Greeks engineer risings in Macedonia and several of the other states a general European war is not an impossibility. Now that the world is on the verge of what would prove to be one of the most fearful carnages in history, the awfulness of such a calamity is more fully realized than ever. European statesmen, if ever before, now require to act with caution.

Whatever comes, though, England will maintain her dignity, and while now Lord Salisbury is all for peace if war should come the British Empire will take the field with that courage and confidence that have carried the Union Jack to victory ln days of yore.

It may be, however, that the war will be confined to Turkey and Greece, and after these two countries have exhausted their energies all danger will be over.
