1—Subscribers who do not give express orders to the contrary are considered as wishing to continue their subscription. 2-If subscribers order a discontinuance of their periodicals from the office to which they are directed they are respon-sible until they have settled their bill and ordered them discontinued.

3-If subscribers neglect to take the periodicals from the office to which they are directed they are responsible until they have settled their bill and ordered them discontinued. 4-If subscribers move to other places

without informing the publisher and the papers are sent to the former address; they are held responsible.

5—The courts have decided that refus ing to take periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them uncalled for

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
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
