It is hoped, however, that this legislation is merely an instalment of the more fully working out of the great Sabbath observance principle."

PROHIBITION PLEBISCITE. The following recommendation was

also adopted by the Synod :-"That while we rejoice at the growth of temperance sentiment, no effort be spared to instruct the young in the sub-lect. And, further, that in view of the approaching prohibition plebiseite, our cffice-bearers, members, and adherents be urged to do their utmost to secure a majority favorable to prohibition so large that the government can have no hesitancy in enacting a prohibitory liquor law with adequate provisions for its en-

Before the vote was taken, however, a discussion took place, Dr. Milligan oppos-ing, maintaining that the probibition plebiselts would not pass, and that pro-hibition, if we had it, would not be worth

BAILEY CASE.

Robert Bailey was removed from the eldership of the Port Credit congregation by the presbytery of Toronto on appeal by the Port Credit people. Mr. Bailey did not abide by the presbytery decision and carried his case to the synod, which body appointed a special committee to investigate the trouble. The judicial commistee sustained the action of the Toronto presbytery, although not bearing it out in all the details. All parties concerned acquisced in the decision with the exception of Bailey.

Mr. Bailey appeared before the synod in reference to his case, saying that while he appreciated the work of the judicial committee sitting on the case, he could not acquires in the decision arrived at by the committee in sustaining the action of the Toronto presbytery. Mr. Bailey will therefore carry his case before the general assembly. The committee, com-posed of Rev. Mr. Houston, Dr. McRae and Rev. Mr. Rogers, will state before the assembly the synod's version of the case. In view of the trouble arising out of the Robert Bailey case, the following motion was passed by the synod:-

"Whereas, experience has shown that is taken up in dealing with matters of detail which could fully and more conveniently be dealt with at the meetings of our several synods: And whereas, according to the proceedure hitherto followed, cases are permitted to come by way of appeal to the general assembly which might be issued in one of the inferior judicatories, and with which the general assembly cannot satisfacturily deal without unduly extending the sittings of that court, and also involving the parties concerned in much needless expense, therefore, the venerable the general assembly is hereby humbly overtured by the synod of Toronto and Kings son that the power of the synods of the church shall be extended by conferring upon them the right of exercising final jurisdiction in all matters of petition, reference, complaint, or appeal, involving matters of administration, or of doctrine affecting the church as a whole, or matters of discipline affecting the ecclesiastical status of any member or office bearer of

The following resolution was passed:-"The synod desires to place on record their sense of the great loss sustained by the church in the death of Mrs. Ewart, late president of the women's foreign missionary society, and the deep sympathy with those especially bereaved by her departure. Her devotion to the cause of night's sleep. foreign missions for the past twenty years has been conspicuous, and to her unceasing, persistent fidelity in the general oversight of the work among the women of the church is largely due the splendid results accomplished by the women's foreign missionary society. Her memory will long be cherished in the circle of noble women who shared with her the great responsibilities in care of the work under their charge. She will greatly be remembered by the large number of workers in the foreign mission field. Mrs. Ewart was also largely connected with many charitable and benevolent itstitutions. She was deservedly appreciated, and will be held in affectionate remembrance by all who knew her. She attained to the great age of four score years and as a fitting close of a consecrated life was permitted to preside at the last annual meeting of the society, whose work for so many years was so much upon her heart. Like ripe fruit she dropped from the trea of time, and was gathered to the heavenly store."

The Rev. Dr. Buchanan, returned missionary from India, addressed the synod attention and thought was given by ministers and others to the subject of foreign missions. He made a touching sppeal, imploring the synod to help exend the gospel to the teeming millions

of India. Votes of thanks were passed to the people of St. Andrew's church, Lindsay, for the excellent arrangements that had peen carried out for the convenience of the delegates. The moderator, Rev. Mr. Cameron of Wyck, brought the synod to a close, to meet in Cobourg the second Tuesday in May, 1898.




