GOLD IN HALIBURTON.—In the township of Hesbarn, in the county of Haliburton, there has lately been found on the properties of the Canadian land and immigration company an ore dyke which is over 60 feet in width, and has been traced for more than a mile. The ore shows strong mineralization, even on the surface, and an assay from one piece of the surface ore gave \$9.25 in gold and \$23 in copper; in other parts of the dyke the mineralization changes, and shows plumbeo. In some sections it is full of small garnets. No development work has been done, the samples having been taken out with a pick.
