County Council.

The county council met Tuesday, the 9th inst., in the office of the county warden, in the hall. Members present, Messrs. Bailey, Bryson, Ellis, Fox, Graham, Johnson, Lithgow, Shaver, and Switzer. Absent, Messrs. Austin and Cameron. The warden addressed the council as follows:

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria:

GENTLEMEN.—It is my duty to inform you of such special matters as have required attention from me as the head of the council since the January session. They are as follows:

1. An effort has been made by the County of Lindsay and the South Riding Agricultural Society to secure the holding of the Provincial Fat Stock Show at Lindsay for a period of three years, and a request having been made of me to call the advisory committee to meet re: repurchase of the town and society with a view of deciding as far as possible what aid would be given by the county. A conference was held on the 3rd day of March and an understanding was arrived at that the committee would support a contribution by the county of one-third the proposed expenditure which was estimated at \$1200. The Provincial Fat Stock association has, however, decided to go elsewhere.

2. Mr. George McHugh found it necessary to tender his resignation of the office of county warden, and the advisory committee met on 10th April to take steps for filling the vacancy. Acting under the provisions of the by-law to meet such a contingency, I appointed Mr. Henry W. Jackson of the township of Ops to fill the vacancy. Mr. Jackson's remuneration was fixed at \$100 to be deducted from the original allowance to Mr. McHugh. In this connection I am pleased to be able to state that the report of the valuator is likely to be submitted for your consideration before the close of this session of the council.

3. At the request of Mr. J. J. Preston, warden of the united counties of Northumberland and Durham, a meeting of himself Mr. S. F. Ferguson, county councillor of the latter county, and Messrs. Fox and Switzer, members of the third division, and myself, was held in the county clerk's office on the 12th day of May to consider the question of the condition of the Pigeon River bridge on the boundary between the townships of Ops and Manvers, and what steps should be taken for supplying definite information respecting the bridge for the use of the county councils interested. Mr. George Smith, engineer for this county, was instructed to examine the bridge and to report on the filling in of the approaches and the erection of a new bridge. The engineer's report will be laid before you.

4. The overseer of county bridges found on examination of the Fenelon Falls bridge that considerable repairs were needed. I instructed him to make such repairs as were absolutely necessary to protect the public from risk, and to report fully for your information. The overseer's report will be submitted.

5. My attention has been called to the probability that the Norland bridge was sinking from its proper level, I have examined it. A slight sagging is noticeable, but I learn this change in its position was observed soon after its construction and has not become more marked.

An important amendment of the Municipal Act was made at the recent session of the Legislative Assembly, affecting the rights of municipal corporations to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of the rates, and I have to ask you to consider whether it affects the validity of the by-law passed at the January session authorizing the borrowing of money to meet current expenditures.

The auditors' report and statement, the estimates for the year and a statement of the money at the credit of the corporation on 31st May will be laid before you.
