NEW R. O. CEMETERY.—With the usual ceremonies the new Roman Catholic cemetery was consecrated on Sunday last, the right rev. R. A. O'Connor D.D., bishop of Peterboro officiating. The new cemetery comprises six acres situated on the north-east portion of Mr. Tully's farm, on the west side of the Sougog, opposite the Riverside cemetery. A fine roadway leading off Lindsay st. has been constructed to the burying ground. The lots are 18x22 feet and half lots 18x18 feet, single graves 3x9 feet. A mortuary vault of stone and brick has been built at the cemetery entrance and coffins will be placed there during the winter for interment in the spring. The cemetery has the natural advantages and in a few years will be a very pretty place.

Town Council.
MONDAY, JUNE 14th.
Present, the Mayor, Reves Touchburn, deputy reeves Gillogly and Robson, councillors Barrows, Baldwin, Graham, Killaly, Mallon, Sootheran and Pedlar.
The following communications were read by the clerk:
From W. F. O'Boyle, township clerk of Ops informing the council that the road commissioner of Ops had expended money on the western boundary and offering to expend a further sum, provided the town of Lindsay spend a like sum.
From Robt. Hudson, referred from the board of health, complaining of an obstruction in ditch in vicinity of his residence.
The following accounts were presented for payment:
Jessie Perrin, \$2; Samuel Howe, \$2. Finance committee.
Wm. Murdoch, \$5. Board of works.
D. Sinclair, \$16.75. Town property.
A petition from Hagan & Co., and others, asking the council to repeal by-law No. 722. Finance committee.
From F. Knowlson, town treasurer, presenting statement of requirements under sinking fund by-laws for collegiate institute and public schools.
Coun. Sootheran presented a statement of estimated receipts and expenditure for year 1897 which, on motion, was received and referred to the finance committee.
Two by-laws, one to appoint a member of the board of health in the place of Thomas Walters, resigned, and one to amend by-law No. 266, to prevent obstructions of the streets, sidewalks (re bicycles) were introduced and passed in the usual manner.
Coun. Sootheran arose to a point of privilege asking on what authority Mr. Sinclair's building on Peel street had been erected, being a wooden structure inside of the fire limits.
On motion fire warden Douglas was heard in reference to the building.
Moved by Coun. Sootheran, seconded by Coun. Graham, that the overseer be and is hereby instructed to have the Oak Hill bill boards that are planted at various places throughout the town removed forthwith.
Moved by Coun. Pedlar, seconded by Coun. Barrows, that the question of a new contract with the light, heat and power company and the requirements of the town in the matter of lighting be referred to a committee of the whole council for consideration.—Carried.
Moved by Coun. Barrows, seconded by Coun. Brynna, that the board of works be instructed to procure at once a set of screens for use at the gravel pit.—Carried.
Moved by Coun. Mallon, seconded by Coun. Killaly, that the following gentlemen be appointed a committee to wait on Squire McDonnell and ascertain the best terms and how much land he will be willing to sell and report at the next council meeting, namely: Mayor Swayth, deputy-revees Gillogly and Robson, J D Flaville, Thos. Brady, and the mover and second.
Moved in amendment by Dr. Barrows, seconded by Coun. Brynna, that the office of Mr. Wm. McDonnell's of a strip of land from the north-east end of McDonnell's boat house running in a straight line to the north-east end of Thos. McDonnell's boat house be accepted at \$160. The amendment was carried.—All except councillors Killaly and Mallon.
Moved by Coun. Baldwin, seconded by Coun. Barrows, that the town property committee be instructed to have the fence lowered to at least five feet on the corner of Kent and Victoria avenue, to give a better view of approaching traffic.—Carried.
Coun. Gillogly gave notice that he would at the next meeting of council introduce a motion to rescind a motion passed at last meeting of council, not allowing loan to be taken from the town.
Mayor Swayth was appointed by the council to examine the books of Thos. Robson, re granting him a reduction in his taxes.
Moved by Coun. Sootheran, seconded by Coun. Mallon, that the fire bell announcing their meetings.
Council adjourned.
