FIRE ALARM SYSTEM. - At a meeting of the

council on Friday evening the tender of Mr.

Brace McBarney to place a fire alarm system

in the town at \$525, was accepted, it being the

lowest tender received. There will be 15 boxes

in all scattered through the town, four in fire-

men's houses, and a 15 inch gong at the fire

hall. The contract was made on condition

that the wires could be placed on the electric

light poles. A committee was appointed to

interview the Light, Heat and Power com-

pany relative to this. The fire alarm system

will supply a long felt want in this town and

marks another advancement in the history of

the town.

ROAD MAKING TEST. - Since Road In-

structor Campbell's visit to Lindsay a short

time ago, the good roads' movement appears

to have received more than passing notice

from the people of this district. The first

tangible evidence of this was seen Saturday

when a test was made of a road grader.

The grader was a machine of the

type made by the Austin Manufacturing Co.,

of Chicago, and was exhibited here by the

company's agent, Mr. Carter, before the

members of the Ops council which body has

the purchase of such a machine under

consideration. The grader was granted Mr.

Carter to use it on Russell st., between Lindsay

and William streets. There was a very large

attendance of county councillors, town

councillors and interested citizens and farmers

present to witness the work. The road bed

was packed very hard and the agent claimed

that 4 team should draw the scraper. Only two

team were put on however, but the work was

very satisfactory. The road was scraped off

evenly, leaving a nice crown on it with the

sides sloping down uniformly. Although

only working two hours on it, the piece of

road operated on compares most favorably with

any of the best roads in town. It is an

undisputed fact that to have good roads we

must have proper machinery. The township

council recognizes this. The sooner the town

of Lindsay does the same, the sooner we will have

the thing like presentable roads. Our roads at

present are a disgrace to any community, and

instead of becoming better, as year by year

passes, they are growing worse. The present

neglect should result in this otherwise pro-

gressive community obtaining good roads.
