NEARING CORE, JUNE 16, 1897. Having accepted the kind invitation of Sir Donald Smith, Canadian High Commissioner, to be his guest in London dur-ing the jubilee, Mr. Hughes, member for North Victoria, left for New York on Tuesday, 8th June, sailing on the White Star steamer, Germanic, on Wednesday, 10th, at noon. New York was reached early in the morning amid a downpour of rain. The city and surroundings looked at their worst, yet the greatness of that vast centre was evident on every hand. Going aboard about 10 o'clock all was found a busy scene. Partings were of all descriptions. Some in tears, others tak-

conviviality; others stately and formal; thers jovial and cheery. The load was heavy in both goods and passengers. Among the voyagers are many Canadians. The Rev. Dr. Milburn, the blind chaplain of the United States senate, accompanied by three daughters of the late Rev. John Gemley, well and favorably known in Canadian methodism, is a general favorite. Others are Capt.
