Letter No. 2.  
Col. Sam. Hughes' Trip to England.

THE QUEEN'S JUBILEE.  
WESTMINSTER PALACE HOTEL,  
London, England, 20th June, '97

My last letter was mailed from Queenstown, the port of Cork, Ireland—indeed it was written and posted on the steamer some hours before reaching that port. Otherwise reference would have been made to a visit the arrival of the British Isles causing great destruction of property and loss of life. The Germanic, however, laughed at the storm and swept into Liverpool making one of her best trips.

On Wednesday afternoon, 16th inst., the fog cleared off and soon the cry went up "The ship is in sight. There indeed was the m. main top of Ireland's famous county Kerry. Close the Germanic drew to the lead until by sunset Bantry bay, the Mizen Head, Brow Head, Fastnet light house, Clear Island, on the entrance to Cape Clear were all passed. The views of Mizen Head and Brow Head were clear. From and go the latter signals were received and given and instantly the news of the arrival flashed over the wires to England and America. The Germanic passed by the Fastnet light house and Clear Island. The light house was simply a magnificent sight. Towering aloft on a precipitous rock, its beautifully colored st. spires for the first time a great old castle which towered stately high on Clear Island, but no way was made for calling purposes. Point after point was passed each having its light house and its busy watchmen to guide the mariners straight.

At 10 o'clock the White Star signal being blue rockets and each in turn was answered by the light houses on shore, by rockets. By ten o'clock the famous Kinsale Point was reached and soon for the bay could be seen the lights at the entrance to Cork harbor.

The First of July.

Peterborough had an excellent team this year and should they command the services of a good bowler this will be a record breaking year in cricket for them. There is a revival of interest in Peterborough cricket. It is now something that is sadly needed in Lindsay.

In the afternoon a tennis match was played on the collegiate tennis courts, Lindsay and Uxbridge participated. The Lindsay people were badly defeated, but have no reason to feel ashamed of their not brilliant opponents. The following is the score:—

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Regular meeting of council. Present, Reeve Touchburn, deputy Reeve Gilgoly and Robson; councillors Burrows, Mallon, Horn, Pedlar, Southerton, Baldwin and Graham.

In the absence of the Mayor, reeve Touchburn on motion took the chair and called the council to order.

Before the clerk had got through reading the minutes of the last meeting and the time adjourned meeting held during the month the Mayor entered and when the minutes were read and confirmed took the chair.

The following communications were read: From Geo. Milne, protesting against the manner in which the side street on Cambridge street, between Wellington and Bond bridge streets, was laid. Referred to board of works.

From Mrs. Sharp, secretary of the Home, in reference to two charity accounts that had been referred to their board, that they had no knowledge of the accounts. After some conversation the matter was left in the hands of the Mayor.

From John P. Barry, asking assistance owing to illness. Referred to the Mayor.

From E. A. Hardy, secretary of the public library, giving a supplementary report of books purchased etc. Finance committee, from Theo. Connelly and others asking for 1500 feet of tile for the repaving of a drain on the east side of Lindsay street.

On motion C. L. Deacon presented the council with a brief history of the drain which had been repaired about 25 years ago when he was chairman of the street and bridge committee. If the request of the petitioners was granted the owner of the property adjacent to the drain would do the work. Referred to board of works and finance committee, to report at next meeting.

From Hurley & Brady and 103 other business men, asking that the license fee for hawkers and peddlars be increased to \$75. Finance committee.

A number of accounts amounting to \$467.84 which included the sum of \$450 estimated expenditure for the Home, were read and referred to the finance committee.

Treasurer's statement of receipts and expenditure for the month of June read, and referred to the finance committee.

From D. Eagleston, auditor, that the accounts for June had been examined and found correct. Fyler.

Report of market clerk for June read. Weight fees collected \$38.25; market tolls, \$15.98; total \$54.23. Fyler.

From the board of health, submitting annual report for 1896; also copy of resolution asking council to have the Kent street sewer flushed tri weekly during July, August and September. Report filed, and the chairman of the town property committee instructed to have the sewer flushed twice weekly during the month of August.

From J. P. Barry, asking to be re-appointed caretaker of the dumping ground, to the table, pending a medical certificate as to restoration of health by the council.

Councillor Southerton, chairman of the special committee to whom was referred the question of the purchase of a road roller, reported that they had purchased a six ton roller from the Austin Mfg. Co. of Chicago, the roller to be shipped here subject to approval. Report adopted.

Report of finance committee read by the chairman, Mr. Southerton, recommending the payment of several accounts, that the refund of a portion of income tax claimed by the representative of the late Dr. Kemp, be returned when a declaration is furnished as to the date the Dr. left Lindsay; to repeal petition of Hughson & Co. as claim to repeal by law No. 182 be not entertained, as the committee are of the opinion the petition was insufficiently signed.

Mr. Hughson was heard in support of the petition, he and Mr. Southerton disagreeing as to whether the petition was sufficiently signed or not. The report was adopted.

Dr. Burrows gave notice that he would introduce a by-law to repeal No. 782, the by-law Mr. Hughson asked to have repealed.

Mr. Robson read a number of reports relating to the town and other matters, all of which were adopted except the one relating to an electric fire alarm system.

Mr. Gilgoly presented reports No. 11 and 12 of the board of works, which were adopted.

A motion extending the time for the collection of taxes to 3rd August, also one granting \$100 to the home ward passed.

Dr. Burrows gave notice that he would introduce a by-law to regulate the width and grading of streets, paving down sidewalks and other matters.

Councillor Mallon moved that the chairman of the board of works be authorized to have all the leading roads gravelled and graded as soon as the road making machinery arrives. In answer to the motion Mr. Southerton said that the collection of taxes to 3rd August, also one granting \$100 to the home ward passed.

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
