#### EAST VICTORIA.

No better man could have been selected by the convention, Wednesday, at Fenelon Falls, to run for East Victoria than its present member Mr. J. H. Carnegie, M.P.P. In choosing Mr. Carnegie the convention did the right thing. A plain, practical man, earnest in his endeavor to do what is right, courteous to all, and with a large, sympathetic nature, Mr. Carnegie is every inch the right man in the right place. He is no professional politician. The place sought the man. As member for East Victoria in the last parliament he did credit to the riding that elected him. As East Victoria's representative that riding has been the gainer and never did an opportunity go by, wherein it could be benefited that its member did not seize on and make the best use of the occasion. Mr. Carnegie is popular with all men, political friend and foe alike, not one but has a good word to say for him, and not one but will acknowledge him to be a gentleman of the true stamp.

Popularity and his past parliamentary record are not the grounds to which he will appeal to the electors however, but the merits of the Ontario liberal-conservative platform. Ontario's growing deficit, the disgraceful acts of those in power, in fact the whole system of government are facts that will govern the ballots of the Ontario electors.

Mr. Carnegie's election is assured. It will not do for his supporters to sit with folded arms and await the results, however. Let the campaign be a vigorous one; get those who are not in sympathy with the present government, show so, not only by their votes, but let their united efforts be exercised on Mr. Carnegie's behalf.

#### Liberal-Conservative Convention East Victoria.

The liberal-conservative convention for the election of officers and selecting a candidate to carry the standard of the party to victory at the next election for East Victoria, was held at Fenelon Falls, on Wednesday, 7th inst. The delegates met in Jordan's hall, the meeting being large, if not the largest held in the annals of the society. All parts of the riding being well represented. A large number came from Ormsby and Emily, and in some cases sweethearts, formed a good and excursion from Lindsay. We will not attempt to give a list of those present, it is sufficient to say that from the old and tried veterans who have grown grey in the ranks, to the youth whose name is on the voters' list for the first time, were well represented. The chair was taken by Dr. Oornwall, 1st vice president, who having called the meeting to order, Mr. John D. Naylor, the veteran secretary, tendered his resignation as secretary, he considering that a younger man should be appointed.

A resolution expressing the sympathy of the convention with the widow of the late J. H. Harvey, late president of the society on his death was passed. This resolution was carried by a standing vote. The election of officers was then proceeded with when the following were elected:—H. J. Lytle, Fenelon Falls, president; Jas. Litvow, Dunstford, 1st vice president; J. R. Moore, Cobocook, 2nd vice president; Dr. Mason, Fenelon Falls, secretary treasurer.

Nominations for candidates for the next election was called for, when Mr. Jas Litvow moved, seconded by Mr. Thomas Thompson, that J. H. Carnegie, the present member be and is hereby the nominee of this convention. The motion was unanimously carried.

Mr. Carnegie returned his thanks for the nomination, assuring the meeting that nothing would be left undone on his part to carry the election, and he felt assured, if the present meeting was to be considered as an index of their feeling, there was no fear of the result.

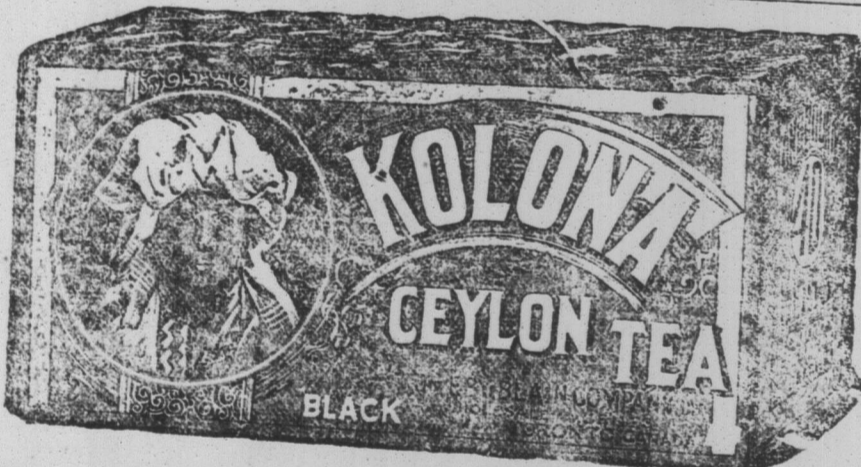
Old fishermen report but poor success so far this summer. Bass are biting tolerably well, but the language!
