Church Notes.

The Rev. J. L. Hughson, B.A., B.D., occupied the Baptist church pulpit at Uxbridge on Sunday.

Lindsayites will be interested to know that at the great Christian Endeavor convention in session at San Francisco last week, the Rev. Robt. Johnson, of London, took a very active part, taking charge of two or three of the big meetings.

Mr. E. D. W. Macmillan, B.A., B.D., brother of the Rev. J. W. Macmillan, very ably filled the Union church pulpit at Sturgeon Point on Sunday.

The Rev. J. A. Hills, of Uxbridge, addressed the Sunday afternoon meeting of the Y.M.C.A.

The regular Sunday meetings of the Y.M.C.A. will be discontinued until September.

St. Andrew's church Sunday school picnic to Jacob's Island on Wednesday was very largely attended.

West Victoria.

Pursuant to notice a meeting of the liberal-conservative of West Victoria, was held in the old opera house, on Saturday last, to select a candidate in the place of Mr. A. C. Macdonald, who was the choice of the party at the convention held last December, who has since removed to British Columbia, and in consequence he withdrew from the approaching contest.

The chair was taken by the president, Mr. Robert Bryans, who explained that the convention was called in consequence of a letter received from Mr. Mrokanis, stating that owing to business engagements in his new home it would be unwise for him to be a candidate.

The following gentlemen were invited to take seats on the platform:—Messrs. F. D. Moore, John McSwey, Dr. Vrooman, James Boxall, J. H. Sootheran, Lindsay; Sam Fox, Johnston Ellis, Ops; E. D. McKeachern, Wm. McKee, Eldon; Arch. Campbell, Woodville; W. A. Silverwood, J. P. Chas. Knight, Oakwood; and A. F. Campbell, Toronto.

Mr. J. D. Hutton, secretary of the association, expressed a wish to be relieved of the duties of secretary, to which office he had been elected in December last. The only reason he had for resigning was that he was a farmer, living about four miles from town, and could not attend to the duties as they should be attended to. He, however, would continue in the future, as he had done in the past, to do all he could to further the interests of the party. The resignation of Mr. Hutton was accepted. Mr. F. D. Moore being elected in his place.

Before the nomination of candidates was proceeded with, a vote was cast for the better government of the association presented by Mr. J. H. Sootheran, providing amongst other things for an annual meeting, to be held in the month of February each year were adopted.

Nominations for a candidate were called and the following were nominated:—Messrs. E. D. McKeachern, ex-warden of Victoria county, Eldon; S. Fox, county commissioner, Ops; J. D. Hutton, farmer, Ops; John McSwey, Lindsay; W. Channon, Lindsay; Marjorie, James Boxall, merchant, Lindsay; W. McKee, farmer, Eldon; Dr. Vrooman, Lindsay; Robert Bryans, coal and wood merchant, Lindsay.

It was agreed that a two-thirds vote of all the votes cast would be necessary to a choice, and that the candidate receiving a two-thirds vote would be the unanimous choice of the convention.

Messrs. Sootheran, Channon and Dr. Vrooman declined to be named others, but for a motion made by Dr. Vrooman that no more resignations would be accepted, which was adopted.

Messrs. J. H. Sootheran and Charles Knight were appointed scrutineers, who after collecting the ballots, reported that 84 had been cast, necessary for a choice 56, and that Mr. Fox had received 58. The announcement was received with cheers, and at the request of the chairman the nomination of Mr. Fox was made unanimous.

Mr. Fox returned thanks for the nomination, and now that he was the nominee of the party, an honor which he never expected or sought for, he asked that each one present would work for him until after the election, and to him all the support they could, as he had an unscrupulous foe, with an army of officials to contend against; and he said that he would not be satisfied until he had secured a two-thirds vote for the party.

Mr. A. J. Campbell next addressed the meeting, stating that it was not the first time he had addressed political meetings in Victoria, but it was a federal politics on those occasions that were under review. They were not here to discuss Dominion politics on the present occasion, but provincial. He would like to say something in its place; the time for discussing them would come in due time. After complimenting Mr. Fox on being selected as the party candidate, where so many good men had been nominated, the speaker went on to discuss the affairs of the province, stating that it was time for a change. The expenditure of the government was more than the revenue and to meet the deficiency, receipts from the sale of timber lands and crown lands were treated as ordinary revenue. A few years more, if the same course was pursued, we would be face to face with direct taxation. Mr. Campbell also referred to other matters, our high appreciation of our leader, Mr. Whitney. During his brief leadership he has shown himself to be entitled to the confidence and esteem of our whole party throughout the province of Ontario. By his skill in debate he has brought before the legislature the serious condition of the financial affairs of this province, and has caused them to see that it is time for a change. We believe that such a change will stay the wasteful extravagance of public money that has gone on for years, that it will give us a more judicious system of education, that it will stop the centralization of power in the Ontario cabinet, to the injury of our municipal government, and that it will give us an honest and wise administration of our mineral and timber lands. We therefore desire to extend to our leader our heartfelt congratulations, and to promise him our cordial and undivided assistance in the coming election for the province.

The meeting was brought to a close by three cheers for the Queen, Mr. Whitney, and the bales.
