He will under proper restrictions expend the annual appropriation in accordance with the annual report of the board works to be adopted annually by the council. He will have full power to employ and discharge all employees in the department, and assume the entire responsibility of obtaining the best results possible in exchange for the money expended in the department; he shall consult with the board of works weekly, and report to the council at least once a month, and oftener if required, and at the end of the season he shall make a unfinished. The system ensures protection by having an efficient man at the head of the department at all times, and will relieve the chairman of the board of works of responsibility and the loss of much valuable time for which he has never been raimbrosed. It is unreason. never been reimbursed. 

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
