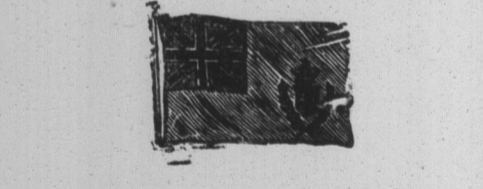

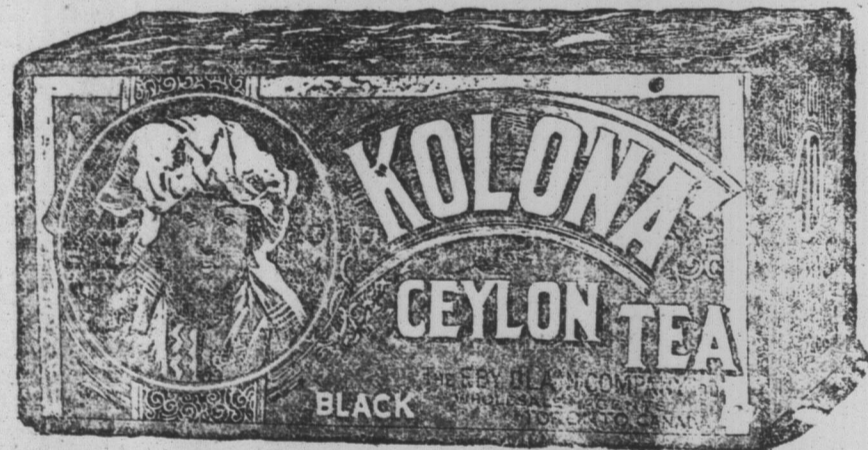
General Superintendent McLaughlin, chief roadmaster Chaser and locomotive engineer Bell inspected the Midland division of the G.T.R. last week.
