Treatment for Drowned Persons.

This is the season of the year when many venturing into deep water or being suddenly seized with cramps or from some mishap or other are drowned. If the proper course of restoration be applied many may be saved. Work deliberately and patiently with a drowned person; animation has been produced after hours of effort. As soon as the body is recovered from the water remove the froth and mucus from the mouth, loosen all parts of the clothes that are tight to the body, hold the body so as to allow the water to run out of the lungs and windpipe. It the ground is sloping turn the patient face down, head down hill, step astride the hips facing the head lock your fingers underneath the belly, lift the body as high as you can without litting the forehead off the ground give the body a quick jerk to remove the accumulating mucus from the throat and water from the windpipe. Hold the body suspended about five seconds before letting it down, then repeat the jerk 2 or 3 times. Without changing the position of the body or that of yourself grasp the [points of the shoulders by the clothing or if naked thrust your fingers into the

armpits elasping your thumbs over the points of the shoulders and raise the chest as high as you can without lifting the head off the ground and hold it long enough to count three. Allow the body to again rest upon the ground with the forehead upon the bent arm the neck straightened out the mouth and nose free place your elbows against your knees and your hands upon the sides of the patients chest over the lower ribs and press downward and inward with increasing torce long enough to slowly count three, then suddenly let go and grasp the shoulders as before. Repeat these two alternate movements ten or fifteen times a minute for an hour at least unless breathing is restored sooner. Use regularity in these movements.
