Three Plucky Sisters.

We are indebted to the Montreal Witness for the following extraordinary story of three plucky young girls in the town of Marysville, Nodaway county, Missouri: "Marysville is considered a quiet

enough place for most of those who live there, but it has been a stormcenter for three young women who edit, print and destate must be wound up.

G. H. HOPKINS. publish a daily newspaper—the only daily paper published in the Congresional district outside of St. Joseph, and the only paper in the United States conducted exclusively by young women.

"The business of journalism is not usually fraught with such thrilling and dramatic incidents as have come to the lives of Pearl, Zoe and Lulu Griffen. whose combined ages fail to reach threescore. Miss Pearl, the eldest, is but 21 years old. She writes the heavy editorials for the paper, and calls herself 'the fight-ing editor'—a function the necessity of which will appear in view of their exciting experiences.

"Zoe, two years younger, is the society editor, and Lulu, the youngest of all, does the sports, reporting for the Daily Review all the horse races, bicycle races and foot races which occur in Nodaway

"The Review is a temperance paper, and in 1890 started to 'clean out' the esting and animated contest up to the day of the election. But the girls were suddenly awakened to a realization of the malignity of the forces they had aroused, when entering the office one morning they beheld the press dismantled, the forms unlocked and the type scattered on the floor.

"This was their first experience; the second was more disastrous. On this coasion the office was not only wrecked. but nearly everything was carried off, and what the assailants couldn't carry off they destroyed. Six forms of what was to be a special advertising edition were gone

into it. "They moved into another office, and being without a press, which, owing to the influence of their enemies, they were unable to obtain, they got a sugar cane crusher, put it on a dry goods box, placed heavy weights at both ends, and in this way they managed to run the paper for four weeks. At the expiration of that time they got a press with a cylinder purposely made so large that it could not be got through any door in the building, and weighted it so heavily that it could

"They were left in peace for about ten months, when the office was again broken again the wreckers were folled. Foreseeing the persistence of their enemies, the girls had placed two cases of type at gency; so, again, after this third attempt, these extraordinary young women came up smiling, and the paper was out as usual on time.




