"The occasion is one in which conervatives and reformers should all unite n order that there may be here in Ontario a government independent of the govern-ment at Ottawa. If they had more light I am sure they would not, and a great many conservatives are discovering that, and are acting accordingly, but even those conservatives who believe in the policy of Sir John Macdonald and prefer the present Dominion government to any other, may still unite at this crisis in supporting an independent government here, because there are great matters with which we have to deal which absolutely require, for the sake of Ontario's interests that the provincial government should be entirely independent of the government at Ottawa. Now there are a variety of cases by which I might illustrate the manner in which the Dominion government have least with the provinces, and show the absolute necessity in the interests of this province that there should be an independent government here under no obligations to Sir John Macdonald, and who have a policy entirely provincial in regard to the territory and provincial

If parents knew the enormous sum that are charged as royalties on school books used in the various public and high schools of the province they would feel still more indignant at the government that allows such a state of things. Last year three publishing firms of Toronto paid \$9,000 for the valuable privileges of issuing the readers alone required in Ontario schools for ten years, and now rake in nearly fifty per cent, profit on the sale of books.
