Brantford, Oct. 12.—The twentieth annual convention of the Ontario women's christain temperance union was opened in the first presbyterian church here at 9.20 this morning under the presidency of Mrs. May R. Thornley, London. After impressive opening exercises had been conducted by Mrs. McCallum, of Kingston, the roll call and minutes of the executive were read by the secretary, Miss Ella Cosford, of London.

Brief, interesting reports, embracing the various industrious branches of the work, were then submitted in the following order: Work among the sailors, Mrs. Britton, of Gananoque; conference with influential bodies, Mrs Wiley, of Richmond Hill; work among railroad men, Miss A, P. Morrison Owen Sound; unfermented wine, M. J. Bates, Prince Albert; school of method, Mrs. Thornley, London; narcotics, Miss Kate Caldwell, Lenark. The reports of all the county presidents

took up the rest of the morning session, and the gathering adjourned after a Bible reading by Mrs. Yeomans, of Winnipeg.
The session resumed this afternoon at 2.30. with a large atlendance. Revs. R. M. Hamilton and D. Hutchison were introduced, and made lively addresses of

welcome to the delegates. A report on the work among the soldiers was submitted by Mrs. E. Starr, Toronto.

Mrs. Spence, of Toronto, followed with a report on the enfranchisement of women. She maintained that enfran chisement would be better for women, their children and their prosterity. It would make a more representative government, put as end to bribery in elections, and bring about more purity
