DEAR SIR, —Since I have seen Mr. Barron's ideas on Commercial Union, I think it would not answer for him to come up around Georgian Bay with them. I would like him to explain where the benefit would be in commercial union here. Last season sixteen million feet of lumber were cut in Midland for the Emery Lumber Co, of Saginaw, and this season there are to be twenty two millions cut for the same company, and ten millions in a part of such township and shall to all intents. Penetanguishene for another company. Alto-gether there are to be about seventy millions cut this season for American Companies in this their mills in the States to be manufactured. therefore I give no effect to this objection. Among millmen it is calculated, if they cut one thousand feet per day for each man em-ployed in the mill it pays them, and take the cost of those men at \$1 25 per day and the amount of money is then put in circulation in this country, at seventy millions for the season's cut. And there have been large tracts of pine bought by American firms in the last year on the north shore. See the amount of money we would lose if they manufactured this in the States.
