

HOME FOR THE AGED.—For several years, there has been felt a growing necessity for providing a home for the aged and indigent of the town, and during the last month, the town council have rented a suitable building on William-street for the purpose. The institution will be under the direction of the Central Charity committee, and will be open to visitants every afternoon. The inmates will be carefully cared for, and the institution will be visited weekly by the clergymen of the town, and the lady directors. As the number of inmates will increase in the future, it is thought desirable, that the burden of support should not rest entirely on the committee, but might be partially sustained as in other places, by voluntary contributions. The committee earnestly ask, that an interest be taken in this work of making more comfortable the declining years of our aged poor. They also ask, that applicants in future be not relieved at the door, as in many cases, assistance has been given to the authorities, but that contributions, as furniture, clothing, and food be sent to the "Home," where they will be under the charge of the Matron. Financial assistance will be gladly received by Mrs. Neelds, the treasurer of the committee.
