Gifts of Poison.

It is time that respectable merchants combined with consumers for the suppression of all gift, prize and lottery schemes in connec-tion with the sale of articles of merchandise. These schemes are not only demoralizing to ligitimate business and to the morals of the ommunity, but in the extent in which they are being carrried in the sale of articles of food have become a source of great danger to the public health. They are, no matter in what from they appear, nothing more or less than devices to swindle honest and unsuspecting

people.

It is gratifying to learn that in some instances the officers of the law have taken hold of the matter. In New York, and also in Chicago, parties who in this way offered gifts to purchasers of their packages have recently been arrested upon indictments for lottery swindling. The latest candidates, both for public execration and criminal prosecution, are the manufacturers of the alum baking powders, who are both, by means of gifts and lottery tickets, disposing of large quantities of their corrosively poisonous compounds, which are so well known to be detrimental to health that no housekeeper will admit them into her kitchen knowingly. This form of swindle is not only being peddled from house to house, but under the promise of large profits to be realized, the manufacturers are entrenching themselves behind the counters many grocers by getting them to offer the alum of the matter.
