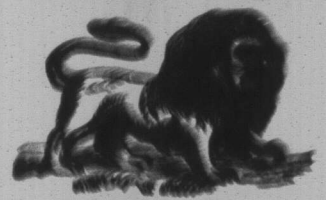

HUNDS TO A VICTORIA CO. BOY.—The following criticism on the present exhibition of the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts appears with reference to the works of Mr. W. A. Sherwood, formerly of this town. The "British" of May 11th and 13th. "W. A. Sherwood has a fine portrait, noticeable for its clear fresh color and harmonious effects. The features of the drooping eye are excellently rendered, and the shading well managed." W. A. Sherwood's portrait of Dr. Scadding is a notably strong and life-like picture. The expression of the subject is extremely natural and the coloring harmonious. This artist has done good work as a painter of animals. His "Pit" is the head of a brown animal, testifying to the accuracy of his delineation of texture. The Toronto Mail of May 12th says: "Messrs. Forbes, Harris and Sherwood have also a number of excellently finished portraits, with one in particular for a female companion. Sherwood's portrait of a lady (No. 12) has been especially noticeable as to its glow and fine finish. Had the artist selected a different color the effect of the portrait would have been more striking in result. In Mr. Sherwood's collection 'a dog's head' is undoubtedly his best. The portrait, No. 122, above mentioned and that of the female portrait in the Academy's collection, refer to a portrait of Mrs. Dr. McKeppin, of this town, whom Mr. Sherwood has recently painted. Lady Londondown on the opening evening of the exhibition paid Mr. Sherwood a favorable compliment on this portrait.
