





BY-LAW NO. -

A By law to provide for draining parts of the Township of Bexley, and for borrowing on the credit of the Municipality the sum of One Thousand and Seventy four Dollars and Sixty-two cents. Provisionally adopted 23rd March, 1888.

Whereas, a majority in number of the owners as shown by the last revised assessment roll of the property hereinafter set forth to be benefited by the drainage have petitioned the Council of the Township of Bexley, stating that there is a large tract of land which is low, wet and marshy in the Township of Bexley, lylag in the south-westerly portion of said Township, almost worthless, but which by a proper system of drainage could be made available for agricultural purposes; and praying that those lands should be drained under the provisions of the Municipal Act.

AND Whereas, thereupon the said Council procured an examination to be made by Geo.

Smith, junior, P.L.S., being a person competent for such purpose, of the said locality proposed to be drained; and has also procured plans and estimates of the work to be made by the said George Smith, jr.; and an assessment to be made by him of the real property to be benefited by such drainage, stating as nearly as he can the proportion of benefit which in his opinion will be derived in consequence of such drainage, by every road and lot or portion of lot; the said assessment so made, and the report of the said Geo. Smith, jr., in respect thereof and of the said drainage being as follows:

To the Reeve and Municipal Council of the Township of Bexley:

GENTLEMEN,-In accordance with your instructions of August 30th, 1887, I have made an Paper Harging & Cal-examination of the swamp lands proposed to be drained in Block E, and Lots I, 2, 3, 4, &c., N.W.B., of the Township of Bexley, and beg to report that said swamp is formed behind a rock bar which shows in the creek bottom in the outlet to Balsam Lake through Block E.
