HARBORERS TO COL. VILLIERS.

The complimentary banquet tendered to Col. Villiers, Deputy Adjutant-General, by the Major-General and staff of the Royal Military College, and the officers of the active militia of the Third Military District, was a complete success.

During the evening Hon. Col. Geo. E. Kirkpatrick, M. P., delivered a brilliant address in response to the toast, "The Parliament of Canada."

Mr. Hudspeh in a careful criticism suggested that the expenditure for the permanent corps could be laid out to better advantage. He favored military schools, but thought that each school would do better and more serviceable work for the militia of Canada if there were fewer permanent corps soldiers.

Mr. Hudspeh's speech was in the right line. However both Col. Straubenzio and Capt. Hewitwell misinterpreted him. They thought he proposed to disorganize the militia. His intention was, and to us his meaning was perfectly clear, to suggest a plan whereby at no greater expense, and with as much efficiency, many times more trained officers might be supplied from the schools to the active militia than are now passed.

Mr. Breen made a very fair speech, but foolishly introduced the question of the Imperial commander-in-chief for Canada's militia. He soon found the temper of the assemblage was in favor of British connection; that, and Capt. Hewitwell very nicely stated the case, Canada is a part of the British Empire, and so are the Canadian militia.

to act energetically. He will be loyally supported in all just reforms. The militia are not in a temper to bear longer the disabilities of bi-annual camps, or a dearth of trained officers.

THE SCOTCH CROFTERS.

The opposition, true to their instincts, are "kicking" against the immigration to Canada of the poor crofters, or island farmer-fishermen of Scotland.

The WARDEE welcomes such people. They have been raised in a barren country which can scarcely support half the population now there, and as humanly cannot well live on air, rock, water, fish and loaves, they are necessarily poor, very poor.

Last century and early in this, the population of Scotland was little over half what it now is in these Highland and island districts. The people followed sheep farming and eked out a bare existence. But though poor, they were honest and possessed of a noble spirit. They formed an emigration scheme to come to Canada, which met with terrible opposition and almost bloodshed.

That was one hundred years ago. These emigrants and their followers are to-day noble citizens of Glangary, of Eldon, of Mariposa, of Bruce, of Grey and other parts of Ontario.

And to-day our view is, "Bring on the Scotch crofters, and the English peasantry." They make noble citizens.
