Useful Baking Powder Facts.

The following hints may prevent some ousekeeper from being imposed upon: If, when two samples of baking powder are tested by mixing with cold water, one of them boils up quickly, effervescing like seidlitz powder, and the other rises more slowly, foaming like yeast, and perhaps standing over the top of the glass, it is an evidence of the purity of the former and the adulteration of the latter. The different action of the second is caused by the addition of flour or lime, or both. Put a little flour in the other and mix it thoroughly, then stir into the water, and the same result is produced, the action being

That Doctor's Bill.

DEAR SIR, -As a humble ratepayer I felt a light shock upon reading the letter in your last issue from and "tr of the council, in explanation of "That Doctor's Bill." Three hundred dollars out of the town treasury for one diphtheretic patient, and that, too, a nonresident! Ye gods! Should the disease ever become an epidemic, the railway debt would be nothing to the awful load that would be piled up upon the long-suffering ratepayers of Linesay. One shudders at the thought.
And Great Scott! \$18.00 for whiskey alone! What a terribly stubborn and demoralizing disease this diphtheria must be anyway! It is said to be caused by innumerable parasition animalculæ that congregate on the mucous membrane of the throat-(suppose that's correct; scunds pretty strong, any way). What wonderful staying powers these wee beasties must have. The champion Capt. Daly pulling against a team of horses tsn't a circumstance to it. Eighteen dollars for whiskey alone for one case of diphtheria, and the bill certified to by a medical health officer!! The treatment must have been of the heroic type; or is it how they do the thing in Memphis? What might not happen in an epidemic in a Scott Act town, where the supply cannot, of course, be large, and might at any moment on a long pull run out? The patient in this celebrated case was detained for two or three weeks at the expense of the town, after the attending physician had certified to his being convalescent and free from contagion. Had he contracted deirium tremens and had to be kept to sober off? Or was he not detained to be handy as a witness against the Kinmount doctor, to satisfy the ends of the then medical health officer, iu a prosecution which failed miserably, but which did not fail to add large unnecessary cost to the town. "A Member of the Council," in last issue, and "Observer" and "Another Observer," in former issues, have failed to give us any light upon the item for this unlawful and uncalled for detention.
