### STURGEON POINT REGATTA

TUESDAY and WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 21 and 22

Mr. H. H. Dunham, promoter of the Sturgeon Point Regatta, was in town yesterday and definitely drew up the programme for the races on Tuesday and Wednesday, August 21 and 22. He attended a meeting at the home of prominent amateur and professional, all of whom guaranteed the best support to this venture. The result was that the following list of races, which cannot fail to prove most exciting, was agreed upon:

**First day, Tuesday, Aug. 21.**  
Sailing canoe race; class A, B and C canoe triangular course, each half a mile, four times around; prize, one of Roger's best Peterboro' canoes.  
Double scull regatta; prize, two handsome gold medals; course into and out of the harbor.  
Amateur single scull race (open to all amateurs) on the course into and out of harbor; prize, silver cup, value \$100.  
**Second day, Wednesday, Aug. 22.**  
Single canoe race, classes 2 and 3 canoes, single blade paddle; course one mile with turn; prize, handsome silver cup.  
Amateur four-oared race, two crews to start mile and a half with turn; prize, four handsome gold medals.  
Professional single scull race, three miles with turn; prize, one of all; prize, \$50, divided into \$25 to first, \$15 to second, \$7 to third and \$5 to fourth.  
On the night of the first day, Tuesday there will be a grand display of fireworks and a parade of canoes illuminated with Chinese lanterns.  
No person eligible to the canoe races excepting members of the American Canoe Association, whose rules shall govern in all cases.  
All entries close at 9 p. m. on Friday, August 19.  
Rules of the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen to govern all amateur rowing races.

Sir—Your last issue will unquestionably refresh the whole protestant world who entertained any doubt of the Rev. Mr. Munt's fidelity to the principles of the reformation. Personally, I congratulate him for the courage he displayed at Bobseygon on the 12th of July last, and the shades of Wycliffe, Cranmer, Kelly, and the "Moble army of martyrs" rejoice that Canada really possesses one man who is "glad to get with other with other in Protestantism, because it is the principle of freedom, and toleration, and if Mr. Munt has paid the same attention to the principles of the order as he would, he would know, ere this, that to "bear false witness against your neighbor" is a violation of the decalogue, prohibited by orationism.

Methodists, the public will justly estimate manliness when they had the Rev. gentleman retreating under a cloud of smoke, and instead of showing to the world the truthfulness of the charges made by him against England's Protestant Church, tries to frighten his opponents with the citation of cases foreign to the question at issue. I am no cleric, but a simple minded layman, unacquainted with the shrewdness as theins displayed, and were I to charge the Baptist Union with infidelity, because the Rev.
