A FACTORY FOR LINDSAY.

Every year Canadian cattle of second quality are shipped to the United States to be fed for canned beef.

There is a factory now here. Let a company be formed to run a canned beef factory in Lindsay.

CANADA'S EXPORTS.

Year by year Canada's exports to England are increasing, 1887 alone showing a gain of \$1,039,917 over the preceding year.

On the other hand Canada imports more from the United States than from Britain by upwards of five millions.

It is gratifying to note that 1887 shows a gain in imports to Canada from Great Britain of \$4,577,540.

In both exports to, and imports from the United States, coal forms a great factor.

In the cattle trade Great Britain year by year receives more of Canada's stock.

In 1879 Great Britain imported not only the United States' worth of Canadian cattle, while the United States took \$140,178.

MORE ABOUT BARLEY.

There are two kinds of barley grown in quantities for brewing purposes. One "hordeum vulgare," or the common four rowed barley of Canada and the United States.

The four rowed is what is chiefly grown in Canada and the United States. It has a thinner husk, slightly smaller grain, contains more starch, requires less time to malt, and makes a better "wort" than the large two rowed barley of Europe.

Thus it is evident the two kinds could not very well be mixed. The success in making good beer lies in having germination nearly even in all the grains.

But, to secure to the Canadian farmer the English market, requires, either that Canadian four rowed barley be partly used by English brewers.

However, the question is receiving thorough investigation now. Following in the path laid out by Adam Hudspeth, Esq. M.P., we understand the Dominion Government are giving earnest attention to the barley question in all its phases.

Over and above the Governmental action, we are pleased to note that South Victoria's member is still leading and pressing the issue, not only through official channels, but also individually.

Mr. Hudspeth has forwarded to England to a personal friend a quantity of Canadian barley in order to have a reciprocal report on the subject.

"FARNELL DEFENCE FUND."

The following letter speaks for itself: Toronto, Oct. 1, 1888.

MY DEAR RYAN.—Since my return here I have been trying, but without success, to ascertain whether any steps are being taken to collect subscriptions in Toronto to the Farnell defence fund.

I would not ask you, save that I expect to leave town in a very few days, and am much pressed meanwhile; and I know your seat in the cause.

HOW THE PRESIDENT IS ELECTED.

On the Tuesday after the first Monday in November every year, the States of the United States elect each as many "Electors," as it is entitled to members of Congress.

On the first Wednesday in December the Electors meet at their respective State capitals and deposit their ballots for President and Vice-President.

On the second Wednesday in February the certificates of the votes cast by the "Electors" are opened by the President of the Senate in the presence of both houses of Congress.

On the third Wednesday in February the House of Representatives appoints the President and Vice-President.

Formerly many States did not vote for the "Electors," the legislatures appointing them; but since 1828 each State has appeared direct to the people.

Last election out of 401 electors, Cleveland had 219 and Blaine 182. New York State alone decided the issue by 1,017 votes as follows: New York gave Cleveland 563,048; Blaine 562,001.

It seems certain that no headway will be made this year towards the erection of Mariposa High School.

The electors of Mariposa are now pretty generally educated on the pros and cons of the High school question.

Now, as one elector explains it, he likes it all. He says now they have a township High school, costing not more than \$400 or \$500 yearly.

There are paid back in salaries and other expenses upwards of \$1,500 yearly; he states large sums from students from other townships boarding in Mariposa.

He goes on to show the other side of the case. Suppose the school be abolished, Mariposa will save the \$500 she raised for the High school.

Large sums in government grants yearly amounting by about \$2,000 what it costs the township; and some from board of students from a distance.

And she will be taxed only a few hundred dollars, and will also have the advantages of Lindsay school.

By retaining Mariposa High school the township will receive: 1. The advantages of a local High school.

grants, and board now expended among her people; and 2. A large sum to support Lindsay school, far greater than her own little High school costs her.
