HOW THE PRESIDENT IS RESOURD.

On the Tuesday after the first Monday in November every leap year, the States of the United States elect each as many "Electors," as it is entitled to members of Congress. For instance, New York has thirty-four members of the House of Representatives and two senators, each State having two. Therefore New York State will elect 36 "Electors" in Novemher. All those entitled to vote vote each for his party's 36. Last election there were in the field Cleveland, Blaine, St. Jonn, Nutler, &c.; but the Electors from each State are all a unit for one candi-

On the Arst Wednesday in December the Electors meet at their respective State capitals and deposit their ballots for President and Vice-President. Prior to 1804 each Bleeter voted for two candidates for President, the one receiving the highest number being president, the other vice president. That is no longer the rule, the President and Vice-President being voted for separately.

On the second Wednesday in February the certificates of the votes cast by the "Electors" are opened by the President tiong as treating is present with additional participation of the Senate in the presence of both plake, she need not despair, however houses of Congress. In case no candiof the Senate in the presence of both date has a majority of the votes cast for President, the House of Representatives chooses the President from the three having the highest number of votes, the representatives from each State counting simply one. Two elections have thus been decided, i.e., Jefferson in 1801, and Adams in 1825, his opponents being Jackson, Clay and Crawford.
