Is PROTESTANTISM IN DANGER?—Let the following answer. There lives in this town of Lindsay a poor laboring man named James Smith, a protestant. For some time his wife has been sick. The family, father, mother and six children lived in a house owned by Rev. Mr. Marsh, the ex-episcopal minister, who is now an enthusiastic romanist.

It appears from the statements of the husband and others that the said Obediah Bigelow has been a regular caller on Mrs. Smith during her husband's absence, and also present on the day of her death. The husband, who is a protestant, was very attentive to the poor woman in her illness, calling regularly; and several protestant women were also very kind, and money was paid for nursing and attending to her.

On Monday morning Mr. Bigelow was on deck running the show. He told Mr. Smith's name, and got a call from the husband's offering to get it. Mr. Bigelow declined, saying he, the husband could pay him. Bigelow, again if he wished to, he then was ordered, the candles were lighted, the usual superstitions, incense and paraphernalia gone through. The funeral was set for Tuesday. Word meantime was sent the brothers of the deceased woman, Mr. Geo. Warner, Victoria Road; and Mr. Peter Warner of Hatley. When George reached the house he was surprised to see the indications of roman catholicism, and was greatly pained on learning the facts. But no time was to be lost. The house was swarmed with business men and others; and the house was at the door. But Mr. George Warner, like a true protestant, forbade the funeral. One roman catholic bully, a member of a firm on Kent street, actually proposed to knock the coffin out through the window; but Mrs. Geo. Warner, as true as her husband, refused to allow it. Mr. Warner hearing the noise, sought to enter the room, but was held by several roman catholics, and nearly thrown. Being a powerful man, he freed himself and gave the interlopers to understand that if they did not disperse he would "draw" on them. Mr. Warner then turned the door out, ordered away the hearse, meanwhile returning Obediah's coffin, and postponed the funeral until Wednesday. Then it took place to Riverside cemetery, where Rev. Mr. Marsh, church of England clergyman, read the funeral service. The citizens are much incensed at the exposure of jesuitism displayed in this instance. There was a poor woman dying in a house owned by Obediah Bigelow, her husband a poor man employed chiefly by roman catholics, but himself, his wife and children all protestants. There was Obediah Bigelow, with his winning smile, paying regular visits to the woman, and there were the "catholic" men in attendance to dig into the dying woman's ears the terrible superstition of roman idolatry. There were the jesuitical visit of the priest and the ordering of the coffin and hearse. But Mr. George Warner appeared on the scene and let day-light in. He proved himself a man, and the public will not forget his action. As for Mr. Obediah Bigelow, the public have long understood him. His husband should keep his tongue handy, and if any jesuit be found sneaking around endeavoring to delude women and children into superstition or romanism, should give him a dose of boiled peas. A ducking in a "horse pond" or in the river, might bring sense to some of these over-zealous jesuits. Let the public awake. These sweet smiling jesuits may even at this moment have your wife or daughter in tow! Protestants need to be protestants to-day just as much as in the past.
