DEAR SIR, -Hearing of considerable rumors in reference to laving of the water main to Victoria avenue, and that it was stated in council that I had offered to put in the pipes for \$275, and I was afterwards advised by Reeve Walters or some other member of the ouncil that my offer was too low and that had better withdraw it; that the mains would be extended anyway. Now, in justice to myself and in reply to those statements, I positively assert they are false. At the time I petitioned the council the estimate I gave was for 500 feet of 4 inch pipe with one hydrant, and would have put it in for the \$275; but when I learned it was a 6 inch pipe in the main and required two hydrants, I withdrew my offer. I was not advised by Reeve Walters or any other member of the conneil to withdraw my offer, and I had no assurance that the mains would be extended when I did so. I did not attend any committee meeting in connection therewith, and when I petitioned for the pipes I had no intention of making any contribution, as I considered it was to the interests of the town to have the water mains extended. I consider the town has not lost \$225 or any other sum in this work, as they have good value for the money expended. You will confer a favor by publishing the above statements.
