I find that where apple trees have been planted they are doing well, and I have come to the option that if planted with apple trees those now waste places would in a very few years be the most profitable parts of this country, and I would atrongly advise the people to plant trees as fast as their means will admit, and I believe if a judicious selection of trees for planting is made and ordinary oare taken of them for a few years, the percentage of loss from trees dying would yield an income that would more than repay all the expenditure. In fact I am fully convinced that it this way these rocky leaded may be made more profitable than the good lands now are.
