Barnstaple or Barum the, ancient latinized name, by which it is familiarly known as a parliamentary and corporate Borough with a population of about 13,000 returning two members to paritament, is the capital of North Devon, and occupies a lovely situation on the right bank at the head of the Tau river. At-Witheral, Miss fr. flowes and others tion in a particle of the first o marked and rapid improvement as Barnstaple, which is noted far and wide for its handsome and well attended market—a sight worth seeing on Friday morning'sits jubiles walks, parks and institutions, and its famous bridge of sixteen arches spanning the river. Barnstaple was formerly a demesne of the Saxon kings and Athelston made it his abode, repairing the town walks and building a castle, the slight remains of which may be traced at the western extremity of the town. Here the river Yeo joins the Taw. Judhael de Totnais, an adherant of the Conqueror, founded a monastery here, which he dedicated to St. Mary Magdaline. The bridge was built in the 18th, and restored in the 19th centuries. To the west is a handsome planza, known as Queen Ann's walks, containing a stature of the good Queen, and re-built in 1798 to serve as a west country exchange. Besides a convent, Barnetaple abounded in religious orders of a minor degree.


