Mr. Crandell consented to amend his motion so as to include the society, but at the requet of the Mayor withdrew it, as he, the Mayor, had not the least doubt but that all the information required could be got without a county grant to the town for charitable purposes, and if the St. Vincent de Paul Society received a portion of it. It was explained to him that the grant heretofore had been made direct to the central charitable committee, consequently, the society had no claim.
