Graham's dwelling and court office was the next to go to the elements; but he saved most of the valuable furniture before the flames got through the building. The next was Messrs. Staples and Anderson's block. A large crowd being gathered by this time from the country made a brave fight, two or three veterans sticking to the wheel till danger was past. On the opposite of the street next to the mill, was Mr. Atchison's residence.
