THE BOARD OF TRADE TO TORONTO.—The deputations, John Dobson, and Sam Hughes, representing Lindsay Board of Trade last Friday waited on the Toronto Board of Trade, to the extension of the "Victoria" railway from Haliburton to Mattawa on the Ottawa.

The Toronto Board received the delegation very favorably, President Matthews, and the members of the council all seeming to be much interested. A. R. Lee Esq., and Wm. Elliott Esq., two of Toronto's leading business men, spoke of the road and, from personal knowledge, recommended its extension. A letter from an Ottawa lumberman, voluntarily written, was submitted, showing the great importance of the railway. Joint action is to be taken.

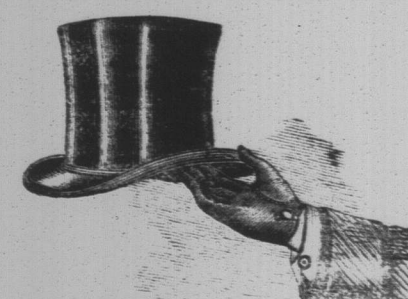
