Sir John and the Orange Order. To the Rditor of The Warder

DRAR SIR, - Without entering into the discussion as to whether Sir John A. Macdonald should or could have constitutionally disallowed the Jesuit Bill, there is, I consider, an unfair comparison made in regard to his action on that bill and the one passed by the the bill for the incorporation of the Orange society, are either wilfully misrepresenting or talking about what they know nothing. Both bills were passed by the provincial legislatures. The one to incorporate the Orange society did not receive the assent of the Lieutenant Governor, but was withheld by Hon. Mr. Mowat to know if it was within the power of the provincial legislature to pass the bill, instead of advising that it be assented to in the usual manner. What was the result? in the usual manner. What was the result? The bill was returned from Ottawa with the answer that it was fully within the power of the provincial parliament to pass it. Tht question then naturally arises, why did noe Hon. Mr. Mowat then advise the Lieutenant Governor to assent to it when he was told by

provincial jurisdiction. The foregoing are the simple facts, and I would like to know if ou a careful reading of them any one can have the hardihood to say that Sir John A. Macdonald disallowed the Orange Incorporation Bill that was passed by the legislature of On-tario, No. It was Hon. Oliver Mowat who advised the course to be taken whereby it did not become law.

Sir John A. Macdonald acted with both bills as being within the powers of the pro-vincial legislatures that passed them. If the nterpretation of the law in regard to the Jesuit Bill by the Minister of Justice be incorrect, no doubt it is in a fair way now of being set right; but in regard to the power of the provincial legislature to incorporate the Orange society, there are no two opinions.


